1. Why do I need this medicine?

- (1) The main components of Clomazole, Lomexin and Zalain vaginal suppositories are antifungal agents. They are used to treat vaginal infections caused by fungi, predominantly *Candida albicans*, commonly known as yeast infections.
- (2) The main component of Esvatin vaginal tablet is estriol. It is used to treat vaginitis, cervicitis, and cervical-vaginal erosion.

2. How is this drug best taken?

- (1) It is recommended to use vaginal suppositories after bathing before bedtime.
- (2) Wash your hands thoroughly and dry them with a clean tissue.

- (3) Tear open the external packaging of the vaginal suppository and moisten it with warm water.
- (4) Following the prescribed dosage, squat or lie down with your knees bent, then use your finger to insert the suppository into the vagina to a depth of about one finger.
- (5) Wash your hands thoroughly again after use.

3. What are some things I need to know or do while I take this drug?

- (1) Vaginal suppositories should not be used on other parts of the body and should not be swallowed.
- (2) Complete the entire course of treatment and do not stop the medication arbitrarily.
- (3) Continue using it even during menstruation.

4. Possible side effects

If you experience persistent irritation, such as burning or itching, please inform your doctor immediately for evaluation.

5. What do I do if I miss a dose?

Take it as soon as you remember. If it's close to your next dose, skip the missed one and continue with your regular schedule. Do not use 2 doses at the same time and be sure to inform your doctor.

6. How do I store this drug?

Store in a cool and dry place at room temperature, away from direct sunlight. Keep out of reach of children.
